Wisconsin's Livestock Facility Siting Law

Many of you within the community have heard about the Livestock Facility Siting Law, either through newspapers, or the public hearings in March, so this information may not be new. However, here are some of the most frequently asked questions from the producers stand point.

What is the Livestock Siting Law?

It is a set of standards that are designed to protect public health and safety, provide producers with a predictable process including a standard application process and timeline for the process and provide an appeal process through the creation of the Livestock Facility Siting Review Board.

Does this rule apply to all livestock operations?

NO. The rule will only apply to new or expanding livestock facilities that

require local approval, and then only if the facility is at 500 animal units or larger. In some areas the animal unit threshold may be lower if there was a zoning ordinance in effect prior to July 19, 2003.

How do I know if my livestock facility is covered?

First thing is to check with your county and local government. Ask whether there is an ordinance that requires local approval for siting or expansion. If there are none then the law will not apply to you. If local approval is required, the law will apply to you. Local approval can take the form of a conditional use permit, permit or license to operate, or feedlot construction permit.

What must I do to get my new or expanded facility approved?

You need to complete and submit the standard application to the appropriate local government. The information in the application will provide all the information needed to approve or deny the facility. If you submit a complete application, the local government must approve the application unless it has other clear and convincing information to show that the application is incorrect

What does a complete application include?

General Information about the applicant, description of the proposed facility, an area map, a site map, and the following six Worksheets: Animal Unit, Odor Management, Waste Management, Waste Storage Facilities, Runoff Management, and a Mortality Management.

Note: if you already have a WPDES permit from the DNR, you do not have to include the Waste Management, Waste Storage Facilities, or the Runoff worksheets in the application for local approval. However, all the other parts of the application must be completed.

What are the fees associated with the application process?

A local government can charge a reasonable fee to offset the costs of review and processing of the application. This fee, however, can not exceed \$500, and the government may not charge any other fee or require an applicant to pay any bond or security. Also, the fee must be set by local ordinance.

What is the timeline associated with the application process?

A local government must notify you within 45 days of whether your application is complete. If the

application is incomplete, the local government must tell you the information that is needed. The local government then has 90 days from notification of a complete application to approve or deny the facility.

Can I appeal a local government decision?

Yes, this may be done through the following; local appeals process, appeal the decision to the State Livestock facilities Siting Review Board, or court.

Persons that may appeal to the decision of the local government include the applicant and any person that resides or owns land within 2 miles of the proposed livestock facility.

Premises Registration

Don't forget to register your premises. Under the Wisconsin Premises Registration Act, anyone who keeps, houses or co-mingles livestock must register their premises by the November 1, 2005 deadline. Premises registration is being conducted through the Wisconsin Livestock Identification Consortium (WLIC) in cooperation with Wisconsin Department of Agriculture.

What is Premises Registration; well it is the first step in establishing a national ID system. Through the registration process a database of locations that keep or co-mingle livestock will be created to shorten the time it takes to track animal diseases. Livestock include cattle and bison, sheep, swine, poultry, goats, horses, deer and elk, and llama.

There is no cost to register your premises, and it is easy to do. There are three options to register, online at www.wiid.org and clicking on the WLIC Premises Registration link; call WLIC at 1-888-808-1910 to request a for a form; or write to Wisconsin Livestock Identification Consortium, 135 Enterprise Drive Suite ID, Verona WI 53593.

Dairy Beef Seminar Set for November

People who work in the dairy beef industry - producers, consultants,

and higher education and extension educators -- can mark their calendars now for a valuable conference to be held Nov. 1 and 2 in Rochester, Minn.

According to Jeff Lehmkuhler, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, this meeting will focus on academic research related to dairy beef production and expertise from industry professionals and producers. Extension and industry representatives are working together to offer this program.

Topics will include an overview of nutrient requirements for dairy beef steers, amino acid nutrition of the young dairy calf, forage to concentrate ratios, ethanol coproduct utilization, implant strategies, Optaflexx, meat quality from dairy steers, market aspects related to Holstein steers, grazing Holstein steers, impact of colostrum and milk replacer on immunity and more.

The meeting will be at the Kahler Grand Hotel, Rochester, Minn. It is sponsored by the North Central Region 206 Feedlot Committee and the 4-State Dairy Management members. Lehmkuhler and Robert Tigner, Iowa State University Extension Farm Management Specialist, co- chair the planning group.
