

The executive board will be making bags for Passages in December. If you have any materials for these gift bags, please get these to the office or to a board member.


Richland County is going to sponsor a Cultural Arts Show for youth and the entries and rules are being developed and will be published soon.

HCE Annual 2018 Conference

I attended the 2018 HCE conference in Pewaukee WI and what an adventure I had. I went to the conference with members of the Richland County Executive board. My roommates made the trip fun and memorable. The meals we were served were delicious, the rooms were beautiful and the staff was so helpful.

I took a class on how to make a wire bracelet. It was fun and frustrating as my eyes and hands tried to place tiny beads on a wire in a pattern. It was challenging but I finally created a beautiful piece of jewelry.

The most memorable thing I will take away from this conference was the class I took on Human Trafficking of our children. I would like to share with some of the facts and information I learned in this class. Did you know Milwaukee is known as the "pimp school"? Fathers train sons to become pimps in this lucrative disgusting business. It is a \$150 billion dollar industry and \$20.9 million worldwide.

What is human trafficking? First of all it is not prostitution. It is the exploitation of young runaways, children who have runaway because of sexual abuse at home, some before the age of 10 years old. It's unsupervised and unloved children, 82% of these kids come from unsupervised low income homes.

Where is this this happening you ask? Restaurants, in group homes, shopping malls, Craig's list, Facebook chat rooms, hotels, modeling ads, and dating sights are just a few. There was a site on the internet called backpage.com that was charged with 92 counts of sex trafficking on their web site. It is happening in Wisconsin. It happened in Marathon count y, WI at a Subway in 2017. Here is a shocker did you know at a Packers Vikings game \$8000.00 was made by sex traffickers that weekend.

A study was done in 8 cities regarding sex trafficking and the revenue was \$39 -290 million dollars a city! Pimps can make up to \$33,000,00 a week and their girls or boys have to make \$1000 a night before they are allowed to come back home.

If you see a child you feel is being pressured to go home or is danger, you can call 211 and report it. You might just save a child's life.

Now on a lighter note the funniest thing that happened to me was, I sat on a wet wash rag and so my bright idea was to get the hair dryer and dry them. So picture this here: 8:30 a.m. in our hotel room, all alone, bent over with a hair dryer pointed at my rear thinking, "Gee, I hope no one walks in on me because what will they think!"

Ready for Adventure

In 1953, when I was 17 years old, one of my three uncles in the Untied States wrote to my family in Erding, Bavaria, asking if any of us eight children would like to immigrate. I said right away that I was ready for the adventure.

With my new visa and Uncle Hans' tickets to America in hand, I took the train with my father to Munich, where I boarded the Orient Express to Paris. I met a lady from Vienna who was going to Chicago on the same ship, and we took a sightseeing bus trip in Paris.

The next morning, we took a train to Le Havre, where the ship *Liberty* was waiting for us. The voyage was calm except for one stormy night. I recall the ship's large ballroom, movie theater, and chapel. Every table in the dining room had a bottle of red wine and a bottle of white for supper each night.

We were all on deck to see the Statue of Liberty, which I'd hard so much about. There was a lot of help for the travelers as we debarked, collected our suitcases in a large hall and got on the train to Chicago. From there I took the train to Milwaukee and then Madison, Wisconsin. I was put in touch with the head nun at St. Mary's Hospital. She spoke German, which was very comforting. She put me up in a hospital room for the night to wait for the morning train to Spring Green and phoned Uncle Hans on his farm near Plain.

After a week on my uncle's farm with 13 cousins, he found me a job as a mother's helper in Plain for the best family one could ever find. The three children helped me learn English, and the parents spoke German, which was also a big help.

Three years later, I married a dairy farmer. We raised four wonderful children together. I thank my lucky stars every day that I've been able to spend 60 years in the greatest country in the world.
