Programming Highlights:

Beef Production: This year Richland County co-hosted a UWEX Cattle Feeders Workshop. There were 25 people in attendance; the workshop covered topics related to Beef Cattle Outlook, Nutrition, Transport Quality Assurance, and Decision Tools. I conducted three Beef Quality Assurance Programs, certifying just over 120 producers.

Dairy Production: I worked with FSA to host meetings regarding the changes to the Dairy Margin Protection Program and worked with a couple of farms on enterprise budgeting and management.

Swine Team Functions: Badger Swine Symposium statewide program that the Swine Team put together for the education of commercial swine producers. It was held at UW-Madison. Also, as part of the Swine Team, I worked with swine producers to become certified in Transport Quality Assurance (TQA), Pork Quality Assurance (PQA), and completed PQA site assessments.

Poultry Production: I was asked to present to a group of poultry producers in the local area on the topic on parasite control in layer houses. I worked with a group of poultry processors and Iowa County Extension Office to form a poultry group, that applied for and received a USDA grant, to explore the feasibility of building a poultry processing facility in Southwest Wisconsin. As part of that, I hosted a focus group here in Richland County and worked with the producer's survey. I was asked to have a poultry display at Farm Technology Days and did a presentation on poultry production. I updated a poultry publication from 1979 titled *Chicken Breeds and Varieties*.

Other Programs: I worked with a group called Food, Faith, and Farming to help organize a series of focus groups around southwest Wisconsin to evaluate the needs of local food and farming systems. I was at two of the focus groups (Richland Center and Fennimore). I hosted two crop events - a winter crops meeting and joint summer field day with Vernon County that focused on crop scouting, water hemp, and UAV technology.

Educational Programs/Partnerships:

FoodWlse provided education to 362 individuals in 2018. Ninety percent of those reached were students in elementary schools.

Elementary Schools:

Second through fourth grade students at Jefferson, Doudna, and Ithaca Schools received nutrition education in the classroom, once a week for six weeks. Lessons focused on USDA's MyPlate and the balance between food and physical activity. Each lesson included accompanying take-home educational material for the family.

Ridgeview Commons:

Strong Bodies program was provided to residents, twice a week for ten weeks. This program is a strength training program that promotes healthy living through exercise and nutrition education.

Food Pantries:

Lessons and food samples with recipes to clients at Richland Center and Riverdale Food Pantries were provided throughout the year. Lessons included: choosing foods from all the food groups, planning meals to save money, and ways to use foods from the food pantry.

Building Relationships:

The Richland County educator built relationships with current partners and reached out to new potential partners in 2018. We look forward to continuing our school-year education and look into expanding our education in the summer time with school gardens. We are also looking forward to providing more parent nutrition education through the school districts in 2019.

Report on 2018 Major Program Priorities

Expansion of Richland County 4-H Program

•Worked with 4-H Ambassadors to identify potential audiences and develop a plan to reach new families. Outreach efforts included two 4-H open houses, 10 WRCO interviews and 14 PSAs, Richland Observer articles, promotion activities at the Richland County Fair, Dairy Breakfast, and National 4-H Week.

Strengthen 4-H Community Clubs:

•Provided orientation for 17 new 4-H volunteers. Training includes information about positive youth development and creating safe environments for kids. •Worked with 4-H Leaders Association to identify needs and develop new programs including 4-H Discovery Day and a Cloverbuds leader workshop •Provided on-going support for 135 4-H volunteers (92 adult, 43 youth) •Worked with six 4-H volunteers who have taken on a new role as the primary leader for a 4-H club •Mentored the leader of a new 4-H club. Assisted with start up of another new 4-H club.

Youth Leadership and Life Skill Development:

•Co-coordinated 4-H ambassador program •Provided training for 31 youth who served as 4-H club officers •Assisted with Junior Leader group •Facilitated leadership team for afterschool 4-H club •Coordinated participation in state and national 4-H educational experiences for older 4-H members. •Worked with 4-H mentors to develop youth/adult partnerships.

Richland Public Schools - Co-led afterschool 4-H club which includes at—risk middle school youth .•Conducted job interviews for RMS Careers class •Taught at 8th grade Wellness Day •Assisted with Drug Prevention Education Day •Taught Food, Fun, and Fitness with Chelsea Wunnicke and Amanda Coorough. •Supported the Youth Risk Behavior Survey Other Community Partnerships - Representative on the Drug-Free Communities Grant application •Partnered with Brewer Public Library to provide educational programs. •Co-taught careers session at College for Kids.
