




"Of Course I'm Using My 'CANE' "

The time came when I turned 80 years old and my five children honored me with a birthday party. Three of those dear children each gave me a "Cane". Two of the canes were wooden and one cane was a metal folding cane.

And, with the canes came the statements, "You had better be using these gifts" as several people in our area had fallen, broken their limbs, ended up in the hospital, and later into nursing homes.

I very faithfully put one cane in the car so I had it with me as I went on my way. I put one cane in my cane rack in the front entry of my home and placed the metal folding cane in my suitcase, so I would have it on my trip to Virginia. And of course, when I came home from Virginia, I had left it standing in a corner of my room, leaving it in Virginia.

I bought another metal folding cane to have at my home, when my sister had knee surgery and asked to use it, and she liked it so much I didn't get it back. But, of course that CANE is being used.

And again, I bought another metal folding cane. On trips, I use this cane to steady myself when walking, to help getting up and down on sidewalks, and going up and down stairs.

At home, I use a cane to walk to the mailbox to get the mail, but drop the cane if someone is passing by, as pride still doesn't want me to let others know of my getting older and using a cane. This is dangerous I know.

My children that live afar, have a cane for me when I visit, and insist I use it on our outings. So here, my cane and I go to Krogers, Hobby Lobby, Kohl's, and more, shopping, me with my cane in hand.

When my children ask me "Are you using the canes? ", I say "Of course I'm using my canes".

I can't reach it from the car window, so I use my "Cane" to pull the mail into reach. See, I am using my cane.

Tuesday, this past week as I was leaving my home to go to the Richland County H.C.E. Executive Board Meeting, I noticed my electric bill lying in the ditch. It had been thrown out of the mailbox when the box was hit and knocked off the post. I got out of the car to retrieve the letter, but the ditch was full of snow and ice. I couldn't reach the letter, so I got my metal cane from the car, got down on one knee and was able to maneuver the letter to within my reach. I was able to get the letter and it went back into the mailbox, ice, mud, and all. See I am using my Cane and I can honestly tell my children that I am using their helpful gifts.

However, a cane makes sense. Recently, on a return trip from Virginia, I fell in the Detroit airport, was taken by ambulance to the hospital to a trauma center, checked out for injuries, and darned lucky to get back to the airport in three hours, onto a plane, and back to Wisconsin. Very scary, but I was very lucky. I should have had my cane out of my bag and it being put to use.

At age eighty-eight, I'm more unsteady on my feet, have had some physical therapy on the use of a cane, and know how important a Cane is to our SAFETY. Special thanks to my children for knowing enough to give such useful and safety wise gifts of a CANE. Of, course I'll use my CANES.
