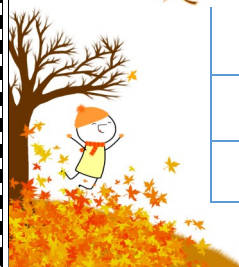

What a strange year it has been. We have not been able to have meetings in person but we are still making a difference in Richland County.

The members of the Reading grandparents are in the process of setting up and video taping members reading books. We will then send the video and books to the schools where we normally read in person for the teachers since we cannot read in person because of Covid-19.

Our mask making project continues we are now in month 5 and our total masks donated by the Richland County HCE members is 6,740 masks. Last two weeks, we delivered 1100 children's masks to four local schools. They were so appreciative and thankful we thought about the kids. So a big thank you to all those who contributed to this project and a big thank you to the sewers who continually sew everyday.

We are collecting hygiene items such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, shampoo, etc. to place in drawstring bags and donate the bags to a women's shelter in the area.

Since we could not do any fundraisers we sold some masks to raise money for our scholarship fund.

On a sad note we did lose a very special HCE member, Charlotte Page, a few months ago to cancer. She was my neighbor, my friend, and had served in several HCE leadership positions. We will miss her. There is a bench dedicated to her in Yuba because of her service to her community.

Our executive committee has been having Zoom meetings to keep in touch and take care of business.

The Richland County HCE Executive Board met Tuesday August 18, 2020 by Zoom and phone at 10:30 a.m. with the meeting called to order by President, Yvonne Chapman. Meeting arranged by F.L.A. Chelsea Wunnicke.

The U.S. Flag Pledge and Homemaker's Creed were recited. Roll call

taken. The July minutes were dispensed as all members had been sent the minutes prior to the meeting by the secretary. Motion to approve as presented by Yvonne Chapman, 2nd, and carried. The treasurer's report was presented by Cecile Haugh, approved as given by Kathy Fanta, and filed.

Our F.L.A. Chelsea Wunnicke is currently working from home due to the virus. She is busy with current programs for families and safety and assisting in our H.C.E. programs.

The Cultural Arts Show was cancelled for July 2020. The State Conference for September was cancelled. These are all because of the coronavirus in the World.

Several groups are making masks for area hospitals, nursing homes, schools, election boards, etc. The Yuba/Hillsboro group have made and given out to others 5,118 masks as of August 18th. Schools are requesting some now also. All are very busy making these and the holders with buttons to wear. Our groups should be very happy with caring and doing so much to protect our area. There were 2 articles in area papers on this project. Clubs are making these in their areas and distributing them wherever needed.

The Yuba homemakers sold \$300.00 worth of masks they made and this money was designated for the 2021 Scholarship being offered by Richland H.C.E.

We are collecting items to make the gift bags for Passages. The Five Points Gals are helping with the cloth bags and Yuba Homemakers are gathering the items to put in the bags. Combs, shampoo, conditioner, washcloths, tissue, tooth brushes, toothpaste, etc. are the types of items being collected. Please get these to Cecile Haugh, who has volunteered at this time to put these bags together and deliver them to Passages.

The Reading Grandparent's Program (Guest Readers) is continuing at the Richland and Riverdale School districts. Any members who want to be readers, please call Eileen at 583-5544. This is along with Delta Kappa Gamma. Scheduling of readers will start in October. We will read at the Extension office, it will be taped, and the schools will use the taped readings at their schedule. The books will be ordered through Scholastic, have labels put in them for H.C.E. and DKG and be given to the classrooms of 6 classes of K/4 in Richland Schools and 3 classes of grade 2 in Riverdale Schools. The County Liners Homemakers is donating into this program. Come join us.

An amount of yarn was donated to Richland H.C.E. and the clubs are using this in a project with assisted living residents and other activities. They are making newborn hats for babies and scarves. These will go to the hospitals and Passages. Thanks for this material.

The Yuba Homemakers are making blankets for Nicaragua from cotton fabric and will these to the state in the near future. Our activities are far reaching and doing good in many areas. Also some of these were made for the area police department to use when youth are involved in accidents, etc.

Former H.C.E. County President Bonnie Clift passed away in August and we offer our most sincere condolences to her family. Flowers were sent and a memorial into the reading program by her club the County Liners , of which she was the current president. RESOURCES FOR LIVING ALONE

So many of us live by ourselves. As we practice social distancing, living alone can begin to feel lonely, but there are many ways to stay connected to friends and family, even if you are not able to visit them in person.

Ideas to stay connected:

- Make a phone call.
- Write letters.
- Video chat with friends, family and neighbors.
- Help others by calling to check in on older children who may be alone while parents or guardians are at work.
- Get creative. Video conference a family dinner or a game night, or visit a virtual museum together over the phone.
- If you have a smartphone or tablet, try a new app! Technology can help you stay connected in fun, new ways.
- Talk about more than just the weather. Reminisce about a family photo, pull out an old joke book, practice asking meaningful questions.
- Brainstorm a list of people that you could reach out to and make a plan to do so.

Take good care of yourself

Most important: If you need medical care or advice, stay home and call your doctor or clinic. If you have an emergency, call 911. If you become sick or feel unwell, make sure a family member or friend knows that you are unwell and ask them to check on you by phone or video chat every day.

- Get outdoors as much as you can. Sit on your porch, go for a walk, work in your yard, or plant a container garden.
- Maintain a regular routine, including mealtimes and bedtimes.
- Find ways to share your skills and talents from a distance. Contact the Extension office or other service organizations to help you find local opportunities you can help with from home.
- Perform random acts of kindness. Send notes or cards to a local residential care facility, make a donation to a local food bank or shelter, or send a note or letter of gratitude to someone in your life.
- Begin or continue a gratitude practice. Make a list of things you are thankful for, or send a note or letter of gratitude to someone in your life.
- Consider a new hobby or revive an old one. Try learning a new language, line dancing or playing bridge online.
- Check some things off your to do list. Organize those family photos or clean out those closets.
- Try to move your body every day in ways that are safe for you.
- It's OK to ask for help. If you are feeling distressed, call the **National Disaster Distress Helpline** (800-985-5990) for emotional support, or call 2-1-1 and ask about your county's emotional support hotline.

- Family contacts
- Neighbors
- Other frequently called numbers

Know the basics about COVID-19

FOR RELIABLE INFORMATION YOU CAN TRUST, about staying safe and what to do if you have COVID-19 symptoms, go to www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/covid-19 or call your public health department: 647-8821 for Richland County.

What are the symptoms? Not everyone with COVID-19 has all of these symptoms. For many, symptoms are mild, with no fever. It is important to know that you can still spread (transmit) the virus to others even if you have mild or no symptoms.

Two to 14 days after exposure, people may experience:

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath
- Sore throat
- Headache
- Fatigue
- Body or muscle aches
- Nausea
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea

What should I do if I develop symptoms?

If you become ill, stay home and call your doctor if you feel you need medical care or advice. **If you are having an emergency, call 911.**

- Each day, write down your symptoms so you can share accurate information with your doctor.
- Make sure a family member or friend knows that you are unwell and ask them to check on you by phone or video chat every day. Even mild illnesses can quickly take a turn for the worse.
- Practice good self-care. Get lots of rest and drink plenty of fluids.

How can I lower my risk of getting COVID-19?

- Stay home as much as possible to protect yourself and others.
- When possible, shop for two weeks of groceries at a time to expose yourself less often.
- Wash your hands regularly for at least 20 seconds especially after using the bathroom, before eating, and after touching door handles, keypads, pens, and other frequently used surfaces.

Bonnie Clift was the current President of the County Liners H.C.E. in Richland County. She had served as President of Richland County H.C.E. in past years and served as several officer positions on the board.

Bonnie was very active in the Richland County Grandparent's Reading program in two school districts. She was active in getting the Little Brown Church in the National Registry. Bonnie loved flowers, crafts, and assisting at projects at area nursing homes. She loved working with youth and especially 4-H'ers. She was a very well-liked and appreciated teacher.

Bonnie was buried at the Little Brown Church in Bear Valley next to her husband, mother and dad, with a private ceremony due to this virus. She is survived by two sisters and two brothers, plus many relatives and friends.

Bonnie M. Clift, 77, of Bear Valley, WI passed away August 2, 2020 at Our House Memory Care Center in Reedsburg, WI. Bonnie was born in Richland County on September 25, 1942 to Walter and Doris Young. She graduated from Ithaca High School in 1960 and from Richland County Teacher's College in 1964. She received her Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Education from UW Whitewater. Bonnie taught school at Washington Caldwell Elementary in Waterford, WI until her retirement.

Bonnie married Everette (Smokey) Clift in July 1964 at the Little Brown Church. They lived in the Burlington, WI area until their retirement when they moved to Sextonville, WI and later built a new home on the Young Family Farm near Bear Valley.
