The Richland County HCE Executive Board met Tuesday, April 5, 2022 at the UW-Platteville Richland East Building with the meeting called to order at 10:00 a.m. by President Yvonne Chapman.

The March minutes were dispensed with as each had a copy to review. Some highlights were reviewed by the group and minutes accepted as presented. The treasurer's report was presented by Treasurer Cecile Haugh, approved as given, 2nd, and filed.

The 2022 memberships were discussed and contact to be made with the Extension office to verify membership.

The Southwest District Spring meeting will be Thursday, April 28 at the Blackhawk United Methodist Church on Highway C in Sauk County. Also some boxes of fabric were given to area H.C.E. members and projects are being developed to use this in the area for service projects.



For several days, I thought my problem of the squirrels was over, but again the noise of little feet was heard in the attic.


